



Wellspring Anglican 2023 Ministry Reports

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You'll remember that for a good portion of these past 12 months, I was not with you, beloved Wellspring, but was rather **on Sabbatical.** I can tell you (and others have told me), that **investment continues to bear fruit.** I returned ready for what God has in store for our church, and have spent the last 5 months feeling increasingly energised and excited.

One of the very positive effects of my stepping down was how others stepped up. Good stuff got done precisely because I wasn't around (not, 'even though' I wasn't around)! This segues well to reflect on what has been the **progress of our four Key Priorities** for 2022-24 that I articulated at last year's AGM. I **praise God and thank you that we have seen progress in each of these over the past year.**

Some of this progress includes:

1. Thriving Generations Ministry (all ages and stages growing)

Appointing a Kids' and Youth Worker; Anna Davy's
commencement in this combined role signalled the
intention to lead our children and young people in life
with Jesus as members of the 'now' church, not just the
future church. Anna's ministry has already been received
very positively, and our under 18s ministry is growing in
number and maturity.



- Youth band; what a great example of **intergenerational blessing**! It has been so heartening to see this group continue to share their gifts, growing in confidence and blessing the 10am congregation.
- Mentoring youth; going on quietly behind the scenes, **gifted young adults are meeting up with teenagers to show love**, listen well, and model the Jesus-life.
- Springkids, Energised, Crosseyed; each of these weekly programmes rely on **members across our congregations giving of their time and talents.**

2. Discipleship Pathway (moving people on in maturity)

- English Practice Class; a new, simple but intentional way of helping people for whom English is not their first language not only get conversational experience, but also discuss the deeper things of faith.
- Men's Ministry; a new opportunity, spearheaded by Sam Gough, **for men** to gather four times a year **to grow in Christlikeness.**



(...Discipleship Pathway continued)

- **Loft Youth**; on Sunday mornings, our teenagers are following an intentional plan for their unique engagement with their bibles and their world, involving sermon reflection, topical studies, and (of course) food and fun.
- Introducing God courses; Resonate continues to host regular opportunities, hosted during Sunday evening services, **for not-yet-Christians to discover Jesus** for themselves. Often this leads them to join Growth Groups.
- Encounter Nights; we are seeing God moving and speaking powerfully during these events, **growing depth and intimacy with Him** in those who've committed to pray, sing, and wait on Him.

3. Leadership Empowerment (equipping the saints)

- My Sabbatical allowed our staff and volunteers the space and opportunity to not only 'plug gaps' but start new things.
- Ministry Training Scheme and Wellspring Traineeship programme; over this year, we have had 5 young
 adults, women and men, go on the journey of joining our staff team, contributing meaningfully to
 our life with Jesus, and discern God's call to ministry. They have reached contexts as diverse as
 hospitals, church music, under 18s ministry, and Dark Mofo.
- Theology Intensive; the third year of this event was another opportunity offered to **help the Wellspring community love God with their whole heart, soul, mind and strength.** We will continue offering this free of charge.
- Sharing preachers; **several Parishes** around the state, with solo pastors and in need of preaching ministry, have **been blessed by half a dozen emerging Wellspring preachers visiting** and serving. We thank God for the opportunity to bless.
- Parent Hope Project; currently underway at the time of writing, this new initiative sees a leader from among us (Vicki Wilkins) **facilitating other disciples in their leadership as parents**. We will continue to offer this course annually, free of charge.



4. Local Community Outreach (sharing life with Jesus)

- Playgroup; launched 12 months ago, this has been remarkably successful at reaching and serving local families, creating a place to belong and an atmosphere in which to connect deeply. I've been a part of most Thursday mornings since its inception, and it's consistently been one of the highlights of my week.
- Collegiate School; Anna Davy brought with her a commitment to visiting Wednesday lunchtimes, working with chaplain Rev. Kate Boughton. This has also led to a new connection with Junior School Chaplain Beck Gough, and we can imagine many more possibilities here.



• Subbies, FOCUS, and Uni Fellowship; we continue to support the work of these ministries, especially thankful for the not-yet-Christians they weekly reach. We **regularly hear how our buildings and resources are instrumental in facilitating these relationships and gospel opportunities.**



 Carols in the Courtyard; it is a 'boutique' offering, amidst the many other like events in Hobart, but our neighbourhood is drawn in by it and hear the good news of Christmas each year. It is an important team effort with many volunteers serving to bless.

I'm also thrilled by what opportunities lie before us. Here are a few **plans** to do more in achieving our **Key Priorities**:

- → **Mentor Equipping Course**; in early 2024, we will welcome Ellie Firth from Deeply Formed to train new and experienced members to grow in this important ministry.
- → **Disability inclusion**; our recent Diocesan Synod resolved to form a working group, of which I'll be a part, to explore how people living with disabilities can take their full part in the life of our churches.
- → **Tightening transitions**; many churches experience drop-offs between certain age ranges. Ours is the gap between youth and young adults. We will focus further on this.



But the major plans will centre around an upcoming **New Ministry Development Fund** application. You may remember, in 2018, one of our residential properties was sold to contribute to the Diocesan financial redress project for survivors of sexual abuse in Anglican settings. Part of the funds from sale were placed into a pool from which we can draw, by submitting an application for new ministry in uncharted territory. The total amount at our disposal is approximately \$100k.

I'm telling you this because Wellspring has a once-in-a-decade opportunity to do something **really significant in sharing life with Jesus**, and of the four Key Priorities, it's been clear to me, our staff, and the Parish Council, that **Local Outreach** is where our focus needs to be in the coming year. The Show Hope campaign of 2020-21 was proof that **Wellspring has the heart and the capacity**: I'd love to see how we could do it again.

So what about a new goal: **Sharing life with Jesus in our local schools!**We already have existing connections, we have the location, we have people strategically placed, we have a strong belief in the value of discipling under 18s, and (as above) we have significant funds to access.

The coming 6 months or so is a time of exploring and deciding what is the path to this great goal. It could involve:

- Planting a new congregation to reach those we are welcoming
- Food ministry for struggling school families
- Partnering with Mustard Tasmania
- Hiring specialist staff
- ... and your ideas will be welcome too

(There's also a really exciting social justice project that I'm still finalising and would love to share with you: it would be another local outreach opportunity for **settling refugees** in Hobart).

Come along on AGM Sunday - I'm keen to share more of this vision with you!

Before I close, it's also important to mention another couple of P words: Progress and Plans are good to reflect on during AGM season, but so is **Prayer and Persistence**.

There has been **much existing life with Jesus that has carried on**, unseen but vital, which does not appear on a bullet point in this report. To those who have faithfully prayed, persisted in serving and financially supporting our Wellspring ministry - thank you.

The fact that we **belong** to Jesus and to one another is expressed in our corporate life as we gather to express and affirm our **belief** in Jesus and **grow** together as we hear God's word and celebrate the Lord's Supper **each Sunday morning**.

Even though we have not resumed post-service morning teas, it has been encouraging to see the number of people continuing to **share with one another** at the conclusion of our service. Many of our members also participate in **midweek Growth Groups**, with some crossover with people from other Wellspring congregations and other churches.

Over the last year, an increasing number of our members have experienced **significant health issues**, making it difficult or impossible for them to attend our Sunday gathering. Our early starting time has contributed to this, so any future revision of the Wellspring Sunday morning program should include a consideration of **how best to respond to the needs of such people.**

We have been **encouraged** in recent times by a small number of **younger people** attending our services. A significant number of 8am-ers regularly attend **Wednesdays at Wellspring**, initiated by one of the 10am Growth Groups, and value this **opportunity to connect** with others each week.

It has been encouraging to note the **quiet and humble way** in which people have reached to **support one another** in times of sickness, sorrow or special need. This has been expressed in ways such as telephone **calls**, providing **transport** to medical appointments, preparing **meals**, **prayer** ministry and **visiting** people in private homes, hospital and places of residential care.

In December 2022 we began a **monthly service** for a small number of our 8am community living in independent units at **Queenborough Rise**. This has grown to the point where we now have about 10-12 people each month, including a number of people who have not been part of a **worshipping community** for some time and others living in the nursing home.

As well as participating in rostered duties at Sunday services and financially supporting the parish, **members of 8am serve in other ways** such as administration, grounds and building maintenance, Parish Council, prayer gatherings and preaching.

Particularly since my serving as locum during Rob's absence, I have observed a **growing sense** among us of our **connectedness to the other congregations** and look forward to this continuing to grow in the year ahead as we **continue to walk together sharing life with Jesus.**

We thank God for His faithfulness for another year to the 10am part of the Wellspring family. Some highlights I can point to:

- Growth Groups; these have **grown in size and number**, for which we praise God. Leaders have also been blessed by **regular training** from Sam Gough. At the recent Prayer Night, it was fantastic to reflect on how He has deepened our belonging and growing together.
- Sunday Lunches; this is a new opportunity, launched this year to host meals in homes, with a curated guest list aimed at cross-cultural and cross-generational relationship building.
- New people; it has been wonderful to see God draw lots of visitors who've become members, contributing and settling in to call Wellspring their home. There's been a range of ages and life stages and enough for at least three **Newcomer Afternoon Teas** in the past year!

• Financial giving; thank you and praise God that we've seen a significant increase in our offertory, compared to 12 months ago. As our largest congregation, it is an encouraging step you've made. You will

see more detail reflected in our Treasurer's Report.

Because of His goodness, we can ask God to provide all we need. Please pray with me for the following:

- Multicultural focus; in October, Wellspring gathered to **thank God** for 30+ years of Chinese ministry amongst us, as that congregation concluded meeting. It was an opportunity for us to consider how all of us bring a different cultural flavour and understanding to being brothers and sisters in Christ. We held festival events in November and February to mark this. There's more we can do here, to truly reflect the good news that is for all nations.
- **Bookstall**; what's been occasional and informal in past months will shortly be a regular feature, with Koorong books being available for sale following 10am services. Book reviews to come also!
- Preaching; what a great breadth of bible and discipleship focus areas we have covered in the past year! The Presence of God; What is the Church; Malachi; Christian Worldview; Romans 8-12; The Ascension of Jesus; Revelation 2-3; Cash & Christ; and currently Ecclesiastes. I continually seek God for what He wants to say to us in a timely way speaking His timeless Word. I look forward to more in the year to come.
- Intergenerational ministry; how can we be a community that values the equal contribution of each age and stage, not only as 'multigenerational' (all ages are there) but intentionally 'intergenerational' (all ages are mutually giving and receiving)? Youth Band

Youth Band has been a joy to be a part of, watching the youth serve the wider community of Wellspring with their gifts and talents. It's also been a great encouragement for me to witness the leadership of Sharon Overton as she facilitates this opportunity for young people to lead while they are guided by other talented musicians. Term 3 brings a break for the Youth Band, yet I am encouraged that youth still have spaces to belong and grow at Wellspring.

Energised

While the new year brought a slow start for Energised as I adapted to my new responsibilities and began recruiting leaders to replace those who could no longer continue, by term 2 we were up and running and I got to experience first hand why it is called Energised - **the energy and enthusiasm of the children on a Friday afternoon is unmatched!**



There is **much potential** still to be reached in this ministry; opportunities to **connect with nearby schools** and invite local grade 3-6 children along, opportunities for our core group of regulars to continue inviting and sharing their faith with friends. I look forward to **continued growth** in each of the children who attend, as well as the number of kids we welcome each week as we share food, fun, and faith with one another.

CrossEyed

It has been a joy for me to get to know the members of our youth group over the last 6 months! They have been **incredibly welcoming of me** and proactive in creating **a community of young people** as they invite friends from school and from last summer's Anglican Camping Tasmania camps, allowing young people from church contexts lacking youth - or no church context at all - to **explore faith with peers**. We've also **rebuilt the CrossEyed leadership team** with only one leader from last year being able to continue on - I'm thankful for God's provision in this area!

I have been continually impressed by the maturity and curiosity of our young people. A survey taken at the end of Term 2 showed that **the youth value CrossEyed for both deep Bible studies and activities which create fun, shared experiences.**

A highlight of the year so far has been the **youth running an entire night of CrossEyed!** They created opportunities for each of us to grow as family and in faith - something we seek to create each week.

SpringKids

Our Sunday kids program has seen **much growth** since the beginning of the 2023 calendar year. With a continuing call for more leaders to best serve and grow these children I praise God for those who have recently expressed a desire to lead. However, **we still need more adults** who are willing to teach a SpringKids lesson, and adults willing to fill the assistant role of getting alongside kids on a Sunday and having one to one conversations throughout the program.

We have also recently welcomed some of our youth into the SpringKids leadership team as **junior leaders**. They are doing an incredible job of sharing their faith with their younger brothers and sisters in Christ. This is a **wonderful discipleship opportunity** for both the children and youth.



Our recent **Big Bible Overview** in Term 2 allowed children to grasp the story of the Bible as one story. It's also created a **fantastic foundation** as we continue to delve into God's Word. While the primary discipleship of children occurs in the family home, it is **an honour and a privilege to partner with parents** and play a role in their children's developing faith.

Loft Youth + Mentoring

Upon commencing my role at Wellspring two of the many ministries that continued running with minimal input from me were Loft Youth and Youth Mentoring. Our young people speak highly of Loft Youth, which runs on a Sunday morning during out 10am Service, for the realness the leaders share with them, and the interactive ways in which they discuss practically applying God's Word to their lives. Another opportunity for young people to do this is through one-to-one mentoring. Almost all of our youth in grade 10 or above are currently being mentored by an adult within the Wellspring community. I thank Camille Imberger for her efforts in both of these areas.

Collegiate

Each week I visit Collegiate's Middle School to help their Chaplain run a lunch time group. It has been a delight to consistently meet with and get to know students outside the Wellspring community. I've also partnered with Beck Gough, Collegiate's Junior School Chaplain, to visit the junior school on a number of occasions and host an excursion to Wellspring. This was, for many of the grade 3s who visited, their first experience inside a church. What a privilege to make them feel safe and welcome inside our building. I hope to continue to work in partnership with the Collegiate chaplains to create great fruit long into the future.

I leave you with a reminder of the importance of childrens and youth ministry, not simply as programs, but intentional ways that children, youth, and adults interact, ministering with and to each other. **Non-parent adults of faith make up the second most influential factor (behind Christian parents) in a young person's faith life.** Having five adults within their faith community who know their name, and walk alongside them in life, is **integral to young people feeling a sense of belonging.**

Thank you to everyone who helps children and youth to belong at Wellspring! And lastly, a massive thank you to each of the volunteers who dedicate their resources, time, and energy to our children and young people week after week.

More **1-2-1 Discipleship** is occurring weekly to train up more mature male and female disciples and leaders.

Growth Groups have been stronger this year, than any year in the past five years.



International students continue to be a growing proportion of the congregation - now about one third. **Celebrating different festivals** from around the world enables us to reach out to different groups from Asia.



Regular dinners and games nights have also created a sense of belonging. The **Scavenger Hunt** was a new event in the social program.

In Acts 14, Paul and Barnabas give a report to their supporting church in Antioch of all the Gospel work they did during their missionary journey. Similarly, it's an honour to report back to you, as representatives of the Wellspring congregations, the work and training done over the last six months.

Parish Ministry

I currently work half a day per week at Wellspring. Primarily, I lead the Thursday night Growth Group, graciously hosted by Ruth McBrien. While working through the study book Mission Unstoppable, I've found that I've adopted a dialogical or Socratic approach to my teaching, which in turn has led to many challenging questions and discussion points that spawn organically from our reading of the Scripture. Because of this, we've implemented a question box for some of the more complex questions and even invited Sam to assist in answering them.

Sam has also allowed me to fill preaching slots in other parishes as needs arise. I have preached on the following dates:

- March 5th: Edge Anglican Claremont, 8 am and 10 am
- April 16th: East Coast Anglican, Swansea (10 am) and Triabunna (3 pm)
- April 30th: Resonate
- July 2nd and 16th: Glenorchy Anglican
- July 9th: East Coast Anglican, Swansea (10 am) and Triabunna (3 pm)
- August 6th: Edge Anglican Claremont, 8 am and 10 am

I have also been assisting Sam in organising and managing several ministry projects and initiatives. A key event has been the Wellspring Men's Breakfasts, with the plan for me to take the reins of organisation and management from Sam. During Dark Mofo, I also took the initiative of leading a prayer walk through the waterfront. As I look ahead into next year, I've already identified two or three potential areas of ministry that I can assist in establishing.

Chaplaincy

My MTS apprenticeship is the first of its kind in Tasmania by pioneering a chaplaincy traineeship in partnership with Anglican Health & Welfare. As such, Paul Hueston has come alongside Sam to train and mentor me in chaplaincy and pastoral care. Because of the unique situation of engaging in a two-pronged apprenticeship, the last six months have been a little rocky as we've navigated these uncharted waters by establishing the dynamic of a chaplaincy apprentice at the hospital. A further complication is that trainee chaplains usually complete the Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) course, which provides the structure for chaplaincy placements; I still needed to finish two subjects for my Bachelor of Ministry studies. Now that I have completed my studies, I have commenced CPE with the Semester 2 cohort.

In late July, I took a week off to reset and recalibrate my uni studies and prepare for commencing CPE. As of writing, I intend to take another ten days off (Aug 19-28) to spend time with family in Melbourne and Sydney.

Support Raising

I'll close out with some brief comments on my income support. My apprenticeship currently takes on a tentmaking model. I'm contracted part-time by the Diocese with my part-time work at Woolworths providing extra support for myself. My support-raising goal has always been to raise an additional two days weekly to reach full-time status and resign from my part-time work.

The ministry workers' grant from the Diocese and the leftover balance from Jackson and Lucy Summerfield, which was very generously rolled over to me, have helped to give me a head start. However, an unsuccessful grant application to the Tasmanian Christian Fund has been a disappointing setback. I continue to explore other avenues of support raising, such as using my preaching visits to promote my support. Sam has encouraged me to remember God's providence in all of this. By God's grace, my prayers have been answered unexpectedly. God has enabled close friends to generously assist in providing for my needs with their available resources.

Thank you for your ongoing prayers and encouragement.

For the past 8 months I have been working as an intern here at Wellspring.

I am 22 years old and **moved down to Launceston a few years ago to study Medicine** with UTAS. This year I've been juggling my studies whilst working part-time as an Intern.

Early on in the year I really enjoyed helping out as a **leader on the Anglican Camp** 'Burst' at Blue Lagoon. It was a rewarding and tiring camp, with lots of fun activities to be part of, heaps of kids to get to know and **many special moments to be the light of Christ and share the Gospel** with them.

More recently I helped to run an **Introducing God course** during the Resonate services for people who are new to Church.

I have also been helping out as a **leader at the Cross-Eyed Youth Group** on Friday nights.

Throughout the year, I have been involved in helping to **run the Resonate services** at Wellspring and have undertaken a number of opportunities to **share sermons with a few Churches** in Tassie. This has been both a blessing to be able to serve in the Church, as well as **a great learning opportunity to develop skills and confidence in ministry.**

Overall, it has been a privilege to be able to undertake this role as an intern, wherein I have learnt so much from opportunities that have arisen throughout the year as well as the teaching and instruction people have provided to me along the way.

English Practice Class



In response to requests from non-native English speaking brothers and sisters at Wellspring **English classes began again in 2023.**

For many years English classes have been a great ministry to people mostly outside of the Wellspring community but this year the approach has been a little different.

We've started slowly with a **focus on equipping** those already involved in the 10am service to **grow in their confidence** using English by exploring **topics connected with faith**.

In term 1 and 2 we had discussions centred round the topics of prayer, worship and community. As hoped these topics were also **familiar enough for people from other faith and cultural backgrounds** to comfortably join.

We've been meeting every few weeks after the 10 am service and it has been a joy to hear the experiences and practices of our brothers and sisters as well as encourage them to share their gifts and wisdom with the wider Church community. Trust us **these guys have so much to offer!**

One of the challenges of being a non-native speaker in a foreign country is building deep connections due to language barriers.

Even for native English speakers in Australia it can be **hard to have deep conversations** with people, even at church!

So, in **term 3 we'll be focussing on ways to have deeper conversations** with people. We've created a **sample menu of topics** and hopefully have some fun as we use those to inspire our conversations.

Early in the term we'll be looking for more volunteers to come join the conversations in the loft and then later in the term we hope to create a conversation space downstairs during morning tea and we're hoping people will take the opportunity to try out our 'conversation menu' with someone they don't know well.

Let us know if you want to be a part of any of this as we seek to connect and grow as a multicultural church.
